

READ

Scripture Reading Matthew 18:21-35

²¹ Then Peter came and said to him, "Lord, if another member of the church^a sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?" ²² Jesus said to him, "Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven^b times.

The Parable of the Unforgiving Servant

²³ "For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves.²⁴ When he began the reckoning, one who owed him ten thousand talents^{LI} was brought to him; ²⁵ and, as he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, and payment to be made. ²⁶ So the slave fell on his knees before him, saying, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.' ²⁷ And out of pity for him, the lord of that slave released him and forgave him the debt. ²⁸ But that same slave, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow slaves who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat, he said, 'Pay what you owe.' ²⁹ Then his fellow slave fell down and pleaded with him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' ³⁰ But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he would pay the debt. ³¹ When his fellow slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. ³² Then his lord summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. ³³ Should you not have had mercy on your fellow slave, as I had mercy on you?' ³⁴ And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he would pay his entire debt. ³⁵ So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister[®] from your heart."

REFLECT

Message

forgive(n)

Thoughts: In the end, then, Peter's question is on the wrong foot, as usual (God bless him!). Forgiveness isn't something you can quantify; in practice, both "seventy-seven" and "ten thousand" are essentially uncountable quantities. Counting, after all, is an avenger's game. Instead, Jesus calls each of us to leave the quantities behind, and embrace forgiveness as a quality of mind and heart, an ongoing bearing, a way of walking, a skillset for living, seventy times seventy times seven. For then forgiveness won't be something we do. It'll be part of who we are, givers and receivers of mercy, children of God living by the grace of God — in tune with "deep physics" of creation, the love beyond measure at the heart of all things, on earth as it is in heaven.

Affirmation of Faith - A Brief Statement of Faith, 11.4

We trust in God the Holy Spirit, everywhere the giver and renewer of life. The Spirit justifies us by grace through faith, sets us free to accept ourselves and to love God and neighbor, and binds us together with all believers in the one body of Christ, the Church. We hold fast to your promises in order that others might come to experience your love through us.

Gracious God, we are bold to pray for those closest to us and even for ourselves. As we wrestle with "what if?" and "what now?" we ask for a sure sense of your providence even when we cannot yet perceive it. Grant us the wisdom to know the next thing we must do in order to follow you. Give us the courage to do that next thing with our whole heart and the faith to do it with joy.
